

CHABAD HOUSE

Sent by the Lubavitcher Rebbe in 1980, Rabbi Zalman Itkin, a"h and his wife Fajgi established Chabad Lubavitch of Hamilton and the surrounding areas. Focusing on the arenas of need, they started Chabad at McMaster and holiday programs for adults and children in the broader Jewish Community. Rabbi Itkin gave classes throughout the surrounding areas as well, for the community in Guelph, a lunch and learn at University of Waterloo and for a number of years ran the Hebrew Sunday School in Brantford.

With the influx of Jews from Soviet Russia, Rabbi and Fajgi Itkin made sure to provide for the spiritual needs as well as assisting in acclimatization to Canada for the new immigrants. Religious texts in Russian, a mass wedding for couples who, due to communism, were never given the chance to have a proper Jewish marriage, and personal assistance were just some of the steps taken.

Concurrent to this there was a lively and active focus on student programming- Shabbat dinners, classes, personal mentoring, holiday programs and more.

In 1994 the Chabad House was purchased to provide a hub for all the student activities and office space for the broader needs of Chabad in Hamilton.

Following the passing of Rabbi Itkin in December 2006 (17 Kislev, 5767) Rebbetzin Fajgi Itkin continued the work of Chabad Lubavitch and in August 2007 Rabbi Chanoch and Shaina Rosenfeld moved to town to join the team.

Over the last 22 years, Chabad House has become the home of weekly Shabbat dinners, BBQ, a giant Sukkah, classes, lectures, the Ralph Travis Memorial Library, JLI and the office where all the planning, accounting, and communications are based.

A Home Away from Home for Every Jewish Student

Café Chabad

A Jewish student attending McMaster University can often be found going back and forth from class to the library and back to class again. Schoolwork consumes a lot of time during the day and night.

Café Chabad offers a safe environment to stop for a moment and relax in a Jewish setting. Fresh, homemade soup of the day, coffee and tea are always available during Café Chabad hours.

A student may choose to spend some time in the Chabad House, schmoozing with fellow students, or with Rabbi or Shaina Rosenfeld. They may snooze on the couch or simply pop by and take a coffee or soup back with them to school.

The beauty of Café Chabad is the relaxed environment it offers. There is no specific action to be done, just warm your heart and bones with something hot on a cold winter day, just like you would do at home.

Café Chabad currently serves between 1-10 students a day, Monday and Wednesday 6:00-8:00 pm, Tuesday and Thursday 12:00 pm -2:00 pm and is offered free of charge.

These years of training and study are also years of maturation. The typical student has never been this independent before. This is truly a time of transition from a dependant teenager into an independent adult.

It is therefore crucial to keep the mind connected to Jewish thought. Chabad House offers this opportunity to every Jewish student in several ways:

- 1) Lessons on specific topics of interest are offered during each semester. These lessons are usually taught using textbooks from the Jewish Learning Institute. The JLI is the largest provider of adult education in the world today. Their lessons and textbooks are of superb quality. More about JLI is available at www.myjli.com
- 2) One on one study on any Jewish topic is available to every Jewish student. Whether it's the guys with Rabbi Chanoch or the girls with Shaina, this provides a wonderful tool for the Jewish student to fill their minds with Jewish thought, each at his or her level.

3) Grill the Rabbi/Rebbetzin

The Rabbi grills a side of beef and then the students grill the Rabbi! Q&A sessions for groups of students – Guys with Rabbi Chanoch, Girls with Shaina- are on the table periodically. These are great ice breakers for the student who is less inclined to attend an official Jewish study group. Any question on Judaism is allowed. The only bad question is the one not asked.

Think Jewish currently serves 1-7 students per lesson and approximately 15-20 students in each Q&A group. Each study group comes with either a full meal or snacks. Think Jewish is offered free of charge.

Jewish Identity at McMaster University

Of utmost importance to us is to facilitate the strengthening of the sense of pride in being Jewish among Jewish McMaster students. Some of the ways we accomplish this:

1) Kosher on Campus. Working together with Hospitality Services on arrangements, kosher sandwiches are now available for purchase in La Piazza in the Student Centre during the school year.

2)

- 3) Kippas on Campus. Kippas in McMaster colours are offered to students at cost price. Students are encouraged to openly display their Jewishness in school.
- 4) Shabbat exam exemption letters are available for students who have exams on Shabbat or YomTov. These letters, printed on our official stationary, are honoured by the university and they will reschedule an exam to an agreeable time/date. In the event of additional issues, we will do everything we can to resolve it, allowing our students to keep Shabbat and the Jewish Holidays.
- 5) We periodically meet with the president of McMaster and/or the dean of students to discuss the challenges a Jewish student may face in university.

Chabad House offers a variety of Holiday experiences and activities to enable each Jewish student to celebrate their Jewishness through the Jewish holidays. Just a few of many examples (some may change from year to year).

- 1) Rosh Hashanah student friendly Shofar service and festive meals.
- 2) Sukka on wheels driving through campus with a Lulav and Etrog.
- 3) Chanuka party where you can make your own Latkes and help build the Menorah.
- 4) Tu B'shvat wine and cheese.
- 5) Purim Party
- 6) Model Seder

Life wouldn't be the same without a little fun and socializing. Here are some of the venues we offer for Jewish students to socialize with other Jewish students in a safe and kosher environment.

- 1) BBQ's. From the welcome back BBQ to the BBQ in the Sukka to the "get rid of the Chametz BBQ or the "just like that" BBQ, Chabad BBQ's are known amongst the students as the best BBQ's in town! Burgers, hot dogs, chicken, veggies all the trimmings and the friendly environment ensure that our BBQ's are among the most attended student programs we offer.
- 2) Girls night in. Various activities for geared for girls only.

Shabbat Dinner

Shabbat Dinner is the crown jewel of Chabad House. It offers students a pause from the life of study to reconnect with their inner Jew, to connect with their fellow Jew, over the best homemade kosher food in town.

The evening begins with Kabbalat Shabbat and the evening prayer, followed by Kiddush and Shabbat Dinner. The needs of all students are taken into account; there are plenty of meat and vegetarian options, and we accommodate students with special dietary needs or food allergies.

The atmosphere at Shabbat Dinner is a very homey one. Many friendships were formed over Gefilte fish, chicken soup and meatballs. There are also a number of married couples who first met at Shabbat Dinner in Chabad House; this is a great source of pride for us.

All are welcome at Shabbat Dinner. Whether a student is affiliated with a different Jewish group or with no particular group, whether they choose to be active Jews or observers, Shabbat Dinner brings everyone together and all Jewish groups are welcome to announce their upcoming events. Chabad House serves as a home away from home, where every Jew is family!

Shabbat 100 is a once-a-year mega Shabbat Dinner with the goal of attracting 100 students with a mega celebration of Jewish pride. The backyard of Chabad House is converted into a dining room with a solid floor and heated tent. Shabbat 100 was the introduction to the Mitzva of Shabbat for a number of students who subsequently became regulars, for others it was an experience of their Jewishness like no other at McMaster.

The average Shabbat Dinner hosts 35-45 students, although it can get as large as 50. Shabbat Dinner as well as Shabbat 100 are offered free of charge.

Jewish holidays for the Jewish community of Hamilton

Chabad Lubavitch of Hamilton strives to enhance the Jewish experience of every Jewish man, woman, and child in the Hamilton – Wentworth area. Our primary mandate is to serve the needs of the Jewish students of McMaster University, however, we don't shy away from work within the community where there is a need for it. Here are some of the holiday programs offered to the Hamilton Jewish community.

- 1) Shofar factory workshop. Jewish children get hands on experience on the making of a Shofar for Rosh Hashanah.
- 2) Sukka on wheels visits as many Jewish businesses as is humanly possible during the few intermediate days of Sukkot. The Sukka on wheels also visits McMaster University and some of the local high schools. Participants on board are given a chance to shake the Lulav and Etrog and have a bite in the traveling Sukka.
- 3) Gore Park Community Menorah- A public menorah set in Gore Park every year starting in 2015 and marked with a communal menorah lighting celebration.
- 4) Public Menorah lighting at Shalom village, with the Mayor in City Hall, as well as a Menorah on the porch of Council Chambers for the duration of Chanuka. Another site of a public Menorah is right in front of the Chabad House at 177 Sterling St.
- 5) Purim celebrations at Shalom village and around town.
- 6) Model Matza Bakery
- 7) The distribution of handmade Shmurah Matzah as well as a Passover food distribution for families in need.

Workshops at the day schools are done for a token fee, some Shmurah Matzah is sold at cost price, everything else is offered free of charge. Our main goal is for the person at the receiving end to enjoy the experience.

The Lamplighter Project

Once upon a time, before electric street lights, there were kerosene street lamps. Several people would be hired to go around town and manually light each street lamp. The lamplighter needed to brave the weather, climb up each lamp, refill the kerosene and rags and light the lamp. Thus, the city or town was illuminated.

Each one of us can be a lamplighter; we can each share what we know with others. To kindle the spark, fan the flame and uncover the blazing light of the Jewish soul.

The name Lubavitch means town of love, a small town in White Russia founded by a Jewish settler who had tremendous love in his heart. This small town later became the seat of the Chabad movement. It was in this town that the deep mystical wellsprings of the Torah were revealed to the laymen for the purpose of contemplation which leads to directed emotion and action, hence the name Chabad Lubavitch.

Learning itself is not enough, it must lead to action. Simply doing a Mitzva is not enough; it must lead to an intellectual and emotional relationship with G-d. The result is a Jewish lamplighter. Here are some of the ways we accomplish this.

- 1) Fresh Challa is delivered around Hamilton every Friday, to add to the joy of Shabbat.
- 2) Holiday goodies and material are distributed before and during each holiday. (i.e. honey cake before Rosh Hashanah, Purim baskets etc.)
- 3) An opportunity to lay Tefillin is provided to Jewish men at work, who did not have a chance to put them on in the morning.
- 4) Mezuzot are available for every Jewish doorpost.
- 5) Assistance is provided to those who wish to transition to a kosher kitchen.
- 6) Torah thoughts are sent out in the e-Parsha emails.
- 7) Training brides and grooms for married life according to Jewish law and spirit.
- 8) Assisting the addition in acts of Tzedaka.

The Lamplighter Project is offered to Jewish people of all ages free of charge.
